

## ***What will happen if I do not abide by the order?***

If you are in a default judgement and do not pay, the following may happen:

- \* Your income tax refund can be taken.
- \* The Office of Child Support Services can submit your name for license suspension.
- \* A lien or hold can be placed on your bank account or insurance settlements.
- \* Your name can be sent to the credit bureau.
- \* Your lottery winnings can be withheld

**All enforcement actions happen AUTOMATICALLY!**

## What you need to Know about Default Judgements

### ***What is a default judgement?***

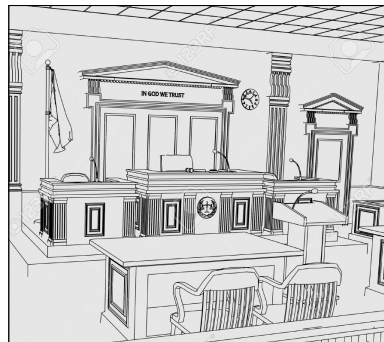
A default judgement is a judgement entered by the court granting one party's request or motion do to the other party failing to appear.

### ***Why am I getting a default judgement?***

You received a default judgement for one of two reasons. The first is because you failed to appear at the court hearing after being served with a witness subpoena. The second reason could be that you did not answer the paternity complaint within the time you were supposed to answer it.

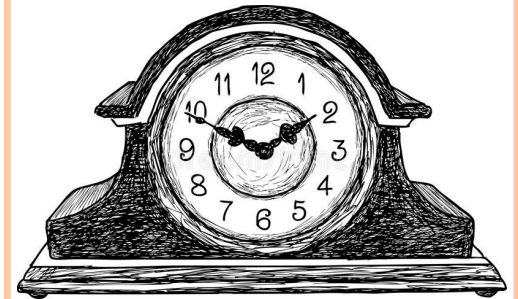
### ***What does this mean?***

This means that the court ruled in favor of what the state proposed in the motion . The court's judgement lists everything you are expected to do. It is important that you obey this order.



### ***What should I do?***

If you disagree with the court's judgement you **MUST** file a written motion asking the court to vacate or remove the default judgement. This motion must list the reason(s) for your request and is time sensitive so **DO NOT DELAY!**



### ***What if the judgement is not vacated?***

If the judgement is not vacated, then the original court order, the default judgement, still stands. You will be expected to abide by whatever was ordered.
